MAJOR WORKS IN PROCESS (THAT SHOULD FILL OUT MY CAREER):

1. *Machiavelli's Florence*. A book that traces the parallels of different arenas of intellectual growth and development that limn the commonalities of the modern that are shared by Machiavelli as he creates, in effect, "agency" and "modern identity" as the key aspect of man-centered creative work.
2. *Designing Political Research*. This book will revise the philosophy of science work in my previous books and chapters and extend the contents to cover the materials in my old research design graduate seminar, the Budapest Faculty Seminar on Political Research, and my new Vanderbilt Philosophy of Science for Social Sciences graduate seminar. The work is unique in drawing from standard social science materials and materials from the humanities (including literary theory) and innovations in qualitative design.
3. *The Political Philosophy of James Wilson*. A study of the vision of pragmatic popular control of government as the foundation of American democracy. The study shows the relation of the "common sense" tradition carried to the new country from Scotland as characterized in the theories of Founder James Wilson. This work is in advanced draft stage and has some commitment to allow University of Kansas Presses have first refusal since it was constructed as part of a series I designed for them on American Thought.
4. *Consensus in Political Theory*. A study of the role of consensus in prescriptive and descriptive political theory from the classics to contemporary analysis. The relations between traditional political philosophy and scientific research is a major theme. This rejoins many earlier publications in a volume that will integrate my career targets into a theory of empirical and normative work.
5. *Public Intelligence and Praxis: The Ethics, Science, and Rhetoric of Public Policy Analysis*. A study of rhetoric as a framework for the ethical, scientific, and political dimensions of public policy analysis that attempts to isolate how knowledge and public responses are linked by political discourse.
